

# **Thoughts From Our Priest Associate**

## **Giving Thanks**



I have much for which to give thanks in this week following Thanksgiving. I join with members of the congregation in giving thanks for the return on Sunday, December 4 of our rector, Stuart Wood, after a three-month sabbatical. I look forward to his sharing of the experiences that he had while away and to the new insights that he has gained.

I give thanks for the extraordinary kindness of Stuart and the Vestry in allowing me to substitute for him in the chancel in the past three months. I have long noticed that one of the signs of a healthy relationship between parishes and rectors is the willingness of the rector to trust that all will be well in the parish during a period away.

I am thankful for wardens Jeanette Adkins and Betsy Evans and for the entire Vestry for their support. I thank them, particularly for the generous \$5,000 contribution to the endowment fund at the Virginia Theological Seminary for the support of the study of the role of African Americans in the life of the Episcopal Church (the Nancy Montague Prichard fund, which is named for my mother). Funds from the endowment are used to encourage research by scholars in the African American Historical Collection at Virginia Seminary and for the acquisition of additional materials for that collection.

I am thankful for the cooperation and support in matters of liturgy given to me by the Rev. Deacon Peg Moncure, Verger Grace Parker, Choir Director and Organist Libby Boyer, the choir, the members of the flower and altar guild, the acolytes, lay readers, ushers, the tech team, the worship committee, and the members of the congregation. Worship is a conversation between officiants and fellow worshippers, which can fall flat when all are not engaged. Even the dogs of the congregation joined in joyfully when they were with us on the Sunday after the feast of Saint Francis of Assisi.

I am thankful for the guidance and support of Parish Administrator Tonya Spears, for the pastoral care provided to members of the congregation by Peg Moncure, and for my wife Marcia's willingness to allow me to complicate the pace of our life in retirement.

But above all things, I am thankful for our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who, as the preface to the Sanctus "of God the Son" in the Eucharist declares, "on the first day of the week overcame death and the grave, and by his glorious resurrection open to us the way of everlasting life." It is in his name that we gather.

Christ Church School has expressed great interest in working with us on this project. We would also like to involve the scouts possibly with Eagle Scout Projects.

We plan to have an informational and planning meeting in January. In the meantime, please fill out the form on the next page, if you have not already done so, and send it to me. There are many ways to help. There will be jobs that are very involved and also jobs that will require minimal involvement. ALL of them are important and needed. "Many hands make light work."

What is Creation Care? Please go to the Diocese of Virginia website (<a href="https://www.thediocese.net/">https://www.thediocese.net/</a>) and do a search for "Creation Care". There are many aspects of this ministry. The one I would like to focus on for Christ Church is in the area of Gardening.

This project would involve the development of a raised bed garden to:

Grow food for those in need in our community. This would enable us to donate fresh food to the Cryer Center for their food pantry. Yes, they already have a food distribution system in place, but the addition of fresh vegetables would be a blessing to those they serve. Provide a haven for butterflies and bees with native plants to help the environment and crops thereby helping to care for God's creation.

Grow flowers for use in church and flowers to give out on food pantry days to spread joy to those who do not have the luxury of fresh flowers in their homes.

By the time you read this, we will have turned attention to two December activities: Our second Live Nativity on December 9, 5-7 pm (rain date December 16), and Christmas shopping for children in an especially needy family that Social Services has brought to our attention. This year our Adopt a Family Christmas shopping does not require assistance from our entire congregation; however, Christ Church's Live Nativity could use your help. The Nativity was featured in last month's newsletter. This month's photo (courtesy of Harriette Floyd) is included to remind everyone what a memorable event this was last year. We would greatly appreciate everyone's assistance with getting the word out to others among your circles of local friends and relatives. It's likely now that our shepherds will have a tiny flock to watch over: two live Shetland sheep! We are hoping for good weather and more visitors and carolers than last year. Year-end is also a time to review a few highlights of 2022, including the various groups our church has been reaching out to and partnering with. Several initiatives were accomplished with Middlesex Social Services, the Cryer Center, and others within CCP. These include the distribution of bags of practical items donated by parishioners that are most often requested by seniors supported by Social Services; Teacher Appreciation baskets overflowing with many useful and delicious items that our hard-working Middlesex teachers receive in the spring; a spectacular Fine Arts Camp experience for middle school students during the summer—for which Deacon Peg is to be congratulated along with all of her volunteers (see video at <a href="https://youtu.be/VN\_zCC6qcRE">https://youtu.be/VN\_zCC6qcRE</a>); and this fall, support of the Christchurch School JV soccer team at home games, also described in last months news but minus a heartfelt thank you received after that from their coach, a portion of which we couldn't resist sharing below.

Last but hardly least, we also know that many individual parishioners, whether or not officially members of our Outreach Ministry, are very generous with their time, energy, and talents in assisting with the Cryer Center's food pantries, yard sales, Backpack Buddies, Thanksgiving and Christmas meal deliveries, Habitat for Humanity, and probably more that we've not yet become aware of.
