

As we approach the 4th of July weekend, I am painfully aware that it has been fifteen weeks since we have been able to worship together in person with each other. I am aware that this is the longest time since I started receiving communion as a child that I have not received communion. The few times that I have celebrated, the host has been reserved for the future and the wine has been returned to the earth. We are all in this together and what you miss doing, I miss doing as well. I am grateful to know that some of you are viewing the services that are being recorded in the church and in parishioners' homes.

So much has happened over these weeks that have caused me to ask myself some hard questions and do some real soul searching. Several weeks ago there was a march in Saluda on Sunday that began at noon at the high school and walked peacefully to the old Court House. I had never participated in anything like that in my life, but I felt a need to experience it and participate. At first, I was only going to the Court House and wait, but then I said to myself that if I was going to experience it then I needed to walk as well. After arriving at the Court House, I found that some others from Christ Church had also participated. Masks, hats, and sunglasses made it difficult to recognize others, so there may have been more. I think that, like the Pharisees of old, I do not always hear, see, or understand the needs of others. The talks that day were respectful, educational and enlightening. I know that we can't rewrite history; facts are facts, but sometimes we do not include all of our history or we gloss over it. Acknowledging our past, both the good and the bad, help us realize not only where our ancestors excelled but also where they fell short. It also helps us to understand why others may see us differently than we see ourselves and vice versa. Right now, we are living in a stressful time due to many different factors, some of which are the pandemic, politics, socioeconomics, and racial equality. One thing that I can say has grown out of this for me is a need to listen to what others are saying, to share my thoughts and to develop a dialogue which is built around trust, compromise, and sometimes just agreeing to disagree. In doing this I am striving to live into the baptismal promises that I reaffirm several times a year by respecting the dignity of every human being.

Hopefully, this may be a conversation that we can all participate in someday. But until then, may the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus our Lord.

There will be no singing, no distribution of Communion elements, no touching, no fellowship before or after worship. Many of you will feel disappointed in these limitations. We may choose to participate in online services until we get back to closer to “normal”. All these restrictions are to protect you and every other member of our congregation.

Some of the other procedures, as set forth by our Bishop, to expect during this phase are:

Physical distancing (6 feet) is required at all times

Wearing of face masks is required of everyone

Handouts will be provided in place of prayer books and hymnals; these will be disposed of in a receptacle when leaving the church. If you have a prayer book, feel free to bring it and then take it home.

There will be no collection plates passed. A plate will be placed near the entrance of the church.

A hand sanitizing station will be placed near the entrance. Please use this before entering.

A Vestry member will direct you to your seat(s), starting from the front of the church. Please remain in this seat during the service. Upon conclusion of the service, you will be dismissed from the back by a Vestry member. Please exit the building and return to your car. Remember, social distancing will be observed at all times (coming into the church, during the service, and leaving the church). This is to ensure the safety of all.

Very careful sanitation procedures will be followed before and after the service. For this reason, there will be only one service, beginning at 9 AM. After the service, it will be available online for all.

As seating will be extremely limited, we will be requiring reservations in advance for those who would like to come. We will announce these reservation procedures as soon as we know the official start date.

Rest assured that Fr. Stuart and your Vestry are very carefully planning this first phase of reopening. We share your feelings that this period may not “feel like church”. Remember that this is the first step in returning to normalcy. Everyone’s cooperation with these guidelines is greatly appreciated and needed. If you have any questions, feel free to contact me.

As I have already mentioned in an update, the Great Room Project, which commenced on April 1st, is now complete! Many of you have offered very positive comments about the room and all of those are greatly appreciated. We have made many improvements to the room in addition to replacing the floor throughout most of the room, and they are all pretty obvious. One improvement that is not all that obvious is the acoustic tiles down the center ceiling area. This has made a difference in the sound quality in the room.

Thanks certainly need to go out to several folks that helped out through various phases of the project. These include Tom Clarke, Bob Guillotte, John Quilter, and Peg's husband, Henry Moncure. They all have some sweat equity in the room. But I felt the entire Parish supported the project, both financially and with positive attitudes. All along, everyone made me feel that this was a tremendous team effort. So, we all owe each other a big **THANK YOU!!!**

The date for completing the kitchen floor is July 17th. I will keep you all posted if there is a change. That will be the final step for the project. Once this is accomplished, I will report to you how the financial picture looks. I can tell you that yes, we did exceed my estimates, but still fell within the donated funds. The additional costs came from unforeseen issues that required work, such as the straightening of the ceiling beams, and the repairing of the floor near the restrooms and in the vestibule to the right of the stage.



It is also important to point out that this entire project took the efforts of nine local contractors, all of who did quality work and adjusted their schedules so that our project could be completed on time. The contractors involved were the following and I would recommend every one of them.

Percy Douglas - Completed the floor demolition and reconstruction
Armundo Juarez of Crossroads Interiors - Completed the plaster repairs
Roger Hubbard - Completed the painting of the entire room
Mike Longest - Straightened the beams in the ceiling
Chris Brown of FiberTec Insulation - Installed the dropped ceiling
Birdseed Electric - Installed the new LED lights
Ryman's HVAC - Renovated the ductwork beneath the new floor
Michael Johnson - Rewired the receptacles beneath the floor
Mill End Carpet - Refinished the stage floor and carpeted the room. Will also be completing the kitchen floor

All that remains to do, once the COVID-19 restrictions permit us, is to utilize the room to its full potential for both Fellowship and Outreach.

Another project that needs mentioning is that Tom and Cathy Clarke have installed a new hal-yard and hardware on our flagpole.

Hopefully, we can all get together soon! Stay Well!

Jeff is my hero and he should be yours too!






This is reprinted from last month but we want to make sure that everyone who wants to can participate in Fr. Stuart's Facebook Sunday Service.

There has been some feedback about confusion while using the Christ Church web sight when folks do not use the options on the left side of the screen and see services on the right side of the page. The services mentioned on the right side of the page are “in church” services and have been cancelled. What you need to

do is as follows:

- Go to CCP Web Site by clicking on this link— <http://christchurchmiddlesex.thediocese.net/default.asp> You can also highlight the link, copy it (click CTRL C) and then paste it (click CTRL V) into your browser.
- The website menu is on the left side of the page under HOME. Scroll to +Worship Services at Christ Church Parish Prerecorded.
- When the cursor hits this link it will turn **red** and will show a menu that will also be **red** of all the prerecorded services.
- The service of the day will not show up until the appointed time.
- You do not have to be on Facebook to see the service or “attend”.
- One of the beauties of these virtual services is “you can be late getting to church” and not miss anything! And no one will stare at you!
- Also, you can go anytime you want after the appointed time.

And, guess what? Pyjamas are perfectly acceptable.!




Christ Church Parish (Episcopal) Middlesex Monthly Newsletter

July Newsletter Altar Guild Article

“Our Altar Window”

There are very few Sundays when someone does not say how beautiful our altar window is. This drawing from Gordon White’s book “Christ Church Parish Middlesex, Virginia 1666-2016” shows the altar window as specified by the Vestry on April 7, 1712. Note that the window was visible from the nave of the church, though there was an openwork “commendable screen” separating the nave from the chancel.


When the church was rebuilt in the early 1840s the window was walled off from the nave and space made there for a sacristy, or robing room. As sad as it is to contemplate now, our beautiful window was invisible to the congregation for almost 90 years, until 1931, when the present Sacristy was built on the north side of Christ Church and the dividing wall inside the church removed.

The work was done with \$4,500 (\$72,000 in 2020 dollars) raised through special donations. Architects Baskervill and Lambert, of Richmond, had planned for the window to be opened to its full 1714 width, but that was not done.

After church one Sunday, walk behind the church and view the brick pattern and shadows that are the site of the original larger window.

The architects drew plans that envisioned tearing out the wall that divided the east end of the church into a sacristy and moving the sacristy to a small brick structure on the north side. They planned that the east window would be enlarged, returning it to its original width.


