

From Our Rector



I don't know about you, but I actually look forward to Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent. Why you may ask? Well, it's like this. Advent and Christmas are so busy with all the preparations for Christmas. There is shopping, decorating, parties, and family gatherings; and so much of it is secular in its focus. Even the end of the Epiphany season is full of revelry and partying with Margi Gras. But Ash Wednesday and Lent give us a chance to step back and focus on what is really important in our faith journey. Yes, St. Patrick's day

may be a distraction and the arrival of Easter candy on the store shelves may be a temptation but for the most part, the secular world hasn't hi-jacked the season of Lent for its own financial gain.

Ash Wednesday may sound morbid to some with the words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" but they are an affirmation that there is nothing to fear because Easter is at the end of the journey and Christ has won the victory for us all by conquering death and delivering us from the power of our enemy so that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his resurrection.

The reward that I find in following Jesus into the wilderness for forty days and nights is experiencing the lengths to which Christ was willing to go in preparing himself for his ministry. "Forty days and forty nights thou wast fasting in the wild; forty days and forty nights tempted, and yet undefiled." (Hymn 150 in the Hymnal 1982) Jesus wasn't just giving up food and water as much as he was putting his whole life and trust into the hands of his heavenly Father. A trust that empowered him to dismiss the temptations of the devil.

The season of Lent is important to me because I'm able to find the discipline to do the things that make my life healthier and my faith stronger. Every year, my doctor tells me that I need to observe Lent 365 days a year. But that is where I fail. That is where – to quote Oscar Wilde – "I can resist everything except temptation."

And we can all do it, with God's help.

May your journey through Lent be one of hope and renewal as we once again approach the great Paschal mystery of our faith.

Adult Education Returning on Sunday Mornings

Please join us on Sunday mornings between the two services for an adult education class which will begin at 9:15 each Sunday beginning on Sunday, March 6th in the Great Room of the Parish Hall. Fr. Stuart will be using a curriculum entitled "Living Discipleship: Practicing Our Faith". This is an all-ages curriculum designed to help individuals and communities know more fully the very things that St. Paul prayed for the Ephesians to find (Ephesians 1:17-19): the God revealed in Jesus Christ. This class offers a survey of the basic beliefs and practices of the Episcopal Church and reminds us that we are the inheritors of the immeasurable greatness of God's power that transforms each of us and strengthens us to serve the world in Christ's name.

The curriculum is based on the book "Walk in Love Episcopal Beliefs and Practices" by Scott Gunn & Melody Wilson Shobe. If you would like to buy a copy of this book, Fr. Stuart has some in his office. The cost is \$17.00.



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As part of my monthly article about the diaconate at Christ Church Parish, I would like to occasionally pass on some information about the history and ministries of Episcopal Church deacons. This month, I am highlighting the ministry of.

David Pendleton Oakerhater "(b. ca. 1847, d. August 31, 1931), also known as O-kuh-ha-tuh and Making Medicine, was a Cheyenne warrior and spiritual leader. He later became an artist and Episcopal deacon. In 1985, Oakerhater was the first Native American Anglican to be designated by the Episcopal Church as a saint.

Captured in the Indian Wars and imprisoned in 1875 at Fort Marion (now Castillo de San Marcos), Florida, Oakerhater became one of the founding figures of modern Native American art. Later he attended college in New York State and was ordained as a deacon in the Episcopal Church in the United States of America. He returned to the West where he served as a missionary in Oklahoma, serving Native Americans.

Since 1985 he has been recognized in the book of Lesser Feasts and Fasts of the Episcopal Church. Grace Episcopal Church in Syracuse, New York is a national shrine to Saint O-kuh-ha-tah, and he was celebrated there in 2005 with a major event including descendants." (**Wikipedia**)

Verger musings...

I was recently asked what brought me to Christ Church. Was it a friend who invited me? (well No, it wasn't but it's a great idea) Was I church "shopping?" No, I'm a cradle Episcopalian and there was no question I was going to attend the nearest Episcopal church unless it was just awful. And Christ Church certainly wasn't awful; it was wonderful. I felt welcome the very first day. I did wonder, however, how I was going to be able to contribute in a church with such a long history and generations of congregants surely holding all the key positions. What would it take to be accepted and involved?

I found out immediately that all it took was a willingness to offer to help. One year later, I found myself delivering the sermon that Father Paul had left for me to present. It was about St. Peter and the "boys in the boat" as one rector called those disciples. I deviated from the text to note that I had wondered how I was going to get into the Christ Church boat when I first arrived. The answer was pretty clear as I stood before the congregation.

Today, that remains true; all it takes is a willingness to help. No invitation is required. I have been scheduling lay altar servers since Miller Smither handed over the job to me in 2007. That amounts to 15 years, about 14 schedules a year, or over 200 times I've sat before my computer filling positions. The people in those positions have certainly changed many times. Some who were here at the beginning have moved away or stepped down. New volunteers have always come forward. And they are all excellent. There is always more room in the "boat" for YOU! All of the ministry heads would welcome new volunteers from the most traditional roles on Altar Guild to the new technology team bringing our service to a worldwide audience.

As a favorite hymn goes: "...for the saints of God are just folk like me, and I mean to be one too"

January was a challenging month with all the snow and cold temperatures keeping the walkways free of ice and snow and making sure all was warm.

We will have a Building and Grounds Committee meeting in March to reevaluate our Maintenance Plan going forward. Our top projects for discussion will be paving the church entrance and a new church sign out at the highway to attract new members, and where these funds will come from.

The mini-split HVAC units in the Fellowship Hall will have repairs done to replace fans and bearings to reduce the loud humming in February. This mission has successfully been completed. Church windows exteriors will be painted in March/April. In March the fire extinguishers will be re-certified to comply with insurance requirements, and we are getting bids to install ice clips over the sacristy doors and A/C units at the church, as one of the units was moved by ice but is ok.

This year our Church Clean-Up Day is being planned for April 2nd (the 9th rain date) which is two weeks before Easter, which falls on April 17th. Please bring blowers, rakes, tarps, energy, and smiles. The Scouts will be helping. FYI-The Scouts will be having a BBQ fundraiser in April like the wonderful one last year. Planning our year: Speaking of calendars, outreach activities that this Ministry's members organize or at least participate in throughout a given year have become so numerous as to require our own master planning calendar which currently shows some activity nearly every month. In addition to adopting that master calendar, we also recently updated the description of our Outreach Ministry that should appear soon on the church website.

Next up: Much of our February meeting was devoted to reviewing upcoming outreach opportunities for our church. Those below deserve special mention because they are also opportunities for other parishioners to join us in meeting the needs of our community.

Gift Bags for Middlesex Seniors: On advice from our Middlesex County Social Services partners, beginning now and into March we will be assembling bags of basic necessities and amusements often requested by local senior citizens in need. Suggested items all parishioners are encouraged to donate are envelopes, stamps, notepads, pens, note cards, crossword puzzle books, and stuffed animals (for comfort). There will be a collection box in the entrance hall of the Parish Hall. The collection will end on March 25.

Cryer Center/Hands Across Middlesex: Dave Cryer circulates regular email notices requesting volunteers to work at Saturday morning yard sales at the Cryer Center. As many of you may know, these events raise the funds needed to cover the costs of keeping the Cryer Center open for use by Habitat for Humanity and Hands Across Middlesex. The latest 2022-yard sale volunteer calendar dated 2/14/22 still showed openings on March 26, June 25, September 24, and November 12. Kudos to Karen Brown and Sharon Colston whose names already appear on that schedule (humble apologies if we've

Catechism Corner

Mission: A small corner of faith, understanding and education



What is a bishop?

A bishop is a successor to one of the Twelve Apostles, who has been consecrated by other bishops. In the Episcopal Church, there are five kinds of bishops: Presiding, Diocesan, Assistant, Coadjutor, and Suffragan. No bishop is "higher" in rank than another. The five kinds just define their function.

What is the role of a bishop?

The Outline of the Faith provided by our Book of Common Prayer answers the question in this way:

The ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as an apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ's name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church, and to ordain others to continue Christ's ministry." (BCP, p. 855)

Thus, a bishop is the chief priest and pastor of a diocese, and all other clergy derive their ministry from him or her.

In the Book of Common Prayer, it states that bishops are those "who carry on the apostolic work of leading, supervising, and uniting the Church." (BCP p. 510)

Also, it restricts the administration of the rites of confirmation and ordination to bishops and also gives bishops great authority over any variations in the liturgy to be permitted within the bishop's diocese.

How do bishops interact with the local parish?

When the bishop presides at a baptism, or they administer the Confirmation or ordains persons to the ministry they represent the whole church.

The bishop travels throughout the diocese to be present in parishes at Confirmation services. The bishop might play an important role when a parish is in transition, or in resolving conflicts if they need pastoral consultative presence or a disciplinary intervention.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

On behalf of the entire Finance Committee, I want to again thank you, the Congregation of Christ Church Parish, for your generosity this year during our annual Stewardship Drive. It was a tremendous success, especially given all the limitations that we have had to deal with due to the continuing pandemic.

As you may recall from our Annual Congregational Meeting, we had 62 pledges this year, which has allowed us to increase our Total Pledge/Non-Pledge income to \$206,300, which is \$10,000 more than last year. That is a tremendous boost to our Parish and its activities for the coming year. Here is a summary of our 2022 Budget.

REVENUE: \$225,423

EXPENSES: \$244,064

TRANSFER FROM CASH: \$18,641



We have had an increase in expenses of \$14,699 over the past year, mainly due to personnel expenses, utility expenses, maintenance expenses, and outreach expenses. We are handling these increases by transferring the \$18,641 from our cash account.

There is an issue that I feel we should all be thinking about, however. And that is we have many important maintenance projects that we're hoping to accomplish this year, the cost of which is not in our 2022 Budget. For example, we need to repave the entrance roadway in front of the church going to the Parish Hall, we need to be replacing our church sign, and there is additional tree pruning that is required. All this comes to roughly \$45,000. To help with this, we are applying for the Peter James Lee Small Church Grant from the Diocese and if accepted, we could get up to \$5,000. This leaves roughly \$40,000 which we could take from Reserves, ask all of us to contribute to these projects, or conduct a Capital Campaign over the next 3 years or so to raise the money for these, plus future projects that are on our Maintenance Plan. The Finance Committee and Vestry will be looking at these options.

It's important to note that no one alone is guilty of letting this happen, but we are all responsible for changing this. It will require an extensive ongoing project that will involve all of us in the congregation, but we are confident that it can and will be done. So, you will soon hear more from the "Elephants" on this particular issue.

In referring to several of our resources on church revitalization, they all suggested we need to look for the "lost sheep." These are the members who used to be with us, but who we have not seen for many months or more. So as a group, we went through our latest directories on February 17th and identified those people we haven't seen. One of the elephants will be calling each of them over the next few days. In doing so, we won't be just asking "Where have you been?" but we'll be "Inviting them" to upcoming events like our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, our Lenten Dinners, our "Clean-up Day" on April 2nd that will include lunch. (Thanks to our Fellowship Committee for this!) In closing for this month, if you have noticed that you haven't seen someone in a while, please give them a call and invite them to one of our upcoming events! We can all do this!!! Thank you!
