

Gordon Eliot White's history of Christ Church, written to celebrate our church's 350th anniversary, is still available and would make an excellent Christmas gift for your Christ Church friends or family.




The book records the story of the original chapels that were merged in 1666 to form Christ Church, lists the 64 known ministers here since 1650 and describes the currents that controlled the English church in the colonies and that led to its disestablishment after the American Revolution.

White uncovered much new information over three years of research for the book.

## A letter FROM the editor: (Moose would not let me use his page)

A good while ago, I volunteered to keep this newsletter going. Father Paul was leaving Christ Church Parish and he graciously showed me how to use the newsletter computer program. Since then, I have done the best I could with my limited typing and computer “skills”. Many people took the time to offer advice, comments and praise, all helpful and inspiring. The experience has taught me a LOT about our church.

I have heard the slogan for years, “Change is inevitable.” Reading Gordon White’s book showed me the struggles that the church has gone through for 350 years, the challenges that the people met and learned from and grew through. The buildings went through storms and fires and war. The congregations survived their human-ness. It was difficult to see Father Paul leave Christ Church Parish. Many churches experience it but it feels very personal when its YOUR church.

From my point of view alone, what I watched happen since then was a determination to survive in our faith and our church. We had questions, frustrations, fears and confusion. Many of us continued to come to services, to kneel together at communion, listen to readings and sermons, sing hymns together and pray. Some folks did not get that far and chose to wait at home but many still financially supported the church from a distance. Change may be inevitable but love is voluntary.

The Altar Guild kept doing their job. The verger lined up crucifers. The readers kept leading us in psalms. The finance committee plodded through the numbers. The choir lifted our hearts. The Brotherhood had great breakfast meetings and survived a rainy Oyster Festival Saturday. The ECW were inspired to help support the Cryer Center and Habitat for Humanity. The Parish House survived a sewer backup and flood and guys worked until 1:00AM to limit the damage and clean up the mess. Parishioners had serious health issues and prayers were offered in their name. Father Stuart and other priests were sent to help us through. The vestry showed up at meetings to do the business of the church.

I looked at the people who helped this church carry on. It was absolutely everyone in their own way.

Everyone makes this church a vibrant, growing place. There are probably at least 50 churches in Middlesex County. You ride by any of them on Monday through Saturday



## The Qualified Charitable Distribution

For those of us “seventy and a half years old or older” (70 1/2 !!) who have a traditional IRA, we are required to withdraw funds annually from our IRA account. This withdrawal is called a “Required Minimum Distribution”. These funds are taxable in the year withdrawn. For those of us that are fortunate to have a sizeable IRA account balance, this can result in a large tax obligation.

The amount of the required minimum distribution is based on your IRA account balance and your life expectancy as determined by the life expectancy tables published by the IRS (Pub 590).

The Qualified Charitable Distribution is an attractive means for qualifying donors or contributors to support nonprofits such as Christ Church Parish. A qualified charitable distribution is generally a nontaxable distribution made directly by the **trustee of your IRA to an organization eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions.**

Such a distribution (cannot be distributed to you) allows qualifying contributors an opportunity to exclude from taxable income these transfers of IRA assets that are made **directly** to nonprofits such as Christ Church Parish.

In the case of distributions to Christ Church Parish, funding can apply to your annual pledge or the Endowment Fund per your instructions. This is an easy means of supporting the current financial needs or future financial needs of our beautiful church and avoiding taxation of the required distribution.
