Our Rector's Message for December "Welcome to Advent"



wreath has been lit, and some not too familiar hymns are being sung in the church. Most of these hymns are only suitable for the Advent season, and therefore many people don't know them since they may be sung only once a year. (So why can't we just sing Christmas carols?)

What is Advent anyway? Well, it is the first season of the church year,

beginning with the fourth Sunday before Christmas and continuing which is Christmas eve. The name is derived from a Latin word for "coming." Therefore, the season is a time of preparation and expectation for both the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and glory."

There is just something that I love about Advent, and that is the tension of trying to live faithfully to the teachings of Christ and the traditions of the Church while at the same time all around us, the secular world is already celebrating Christmas – a Christmas that often ends at midnight on Christmas day. But the focus of their Christmas is Santa, shopping, gifts, and parties. And along with it comes the stress of

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what to buy this or that person, overspending, overeating, and trying to keep the extended family happy by making all the appointed rounds.



For us in the Church, we begin the season by being reminded that we don't stay awake and alert in order to catch Santa coming down the chimney but to be ready when the Son of Man comes in clouds with great power and glory. It is only after we have been reminded of what to watch for that our focus then shifts to what has already happened. And that is the nativity of our Lord. As Advent ends, we then begin not just a day of celebration, but twelve full days of celebration. We begin by thanking God for the gift of his son while watching the world around us pack up Christmas because they're tired of all the decorations that have been up since before Thanksgiving and the Christmas music that filled the airwaves but has become suddenly absent once Christmas truly begins.

I like Advent because, by focusing on it as a season in its own right, it helps me keep the Christmas season for what it started out to be in the first place – the celebration of the birth of Emmanuel – God with us, and the importance of sharing that gift with others, for it is the greatest gift of all.

Remember that even if you file taxes on the short form, for 2020 the Cares Act allows you to deduct \$300 for charitable giving. Also, if you have an IRA, you may make a gift directly from the IRA to Christ Church Parish. The amount you give counts toward your Required Minimum Distribution, but does not count as taxable income. (Of course, you should always check with your tax advisor).

So, please think small - and think about our small church. However, when deciding on your pledge or contribution amount, think big!



Scrípture Cake

I cup Psalms 55:21 (use either or both)

2) 2 cups Jeremíah 6:20 (last part of the verse)

6 Job 39:14

- 3 tablespoons 1 Samuel 14:25
- ¹/₂ cup Judges 4:19 (first sentence)
- 4 ¹/₂ cups 1 Kings 4:22 (first part of the verse)
- 2 teaspoons Levítícus 2:13
- 2 teaspoons Amos 4:5
- 2 Chronicles 9:9 (1/2 teaspoons each of cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg)
- 2 cups Numbers 17:8 chopped
- 2 cups both things in 1 Samuel 30:12, chopped (4 cups total)

Mix in a larger bowl in order given, beating in eggs until light and fluffy. Add the last two ingredients by hand. Following Solomon's advice for making a good boy (Proverbs 23:13) and you will have a good cake. Bake at 250 degrees for 2 ½ hours in 4 small "bread pans" buttered. Allow to cool in pans, on their sides, on a rack. Turn out cakes. You COULD wrap them in cheesecloth soaked with sherry or any whiskey. And you could share them...just saying...

CHARITY IN A DIFFICULT YEAR

The Pandemic and new tax laws call for different ways to give.

All of us, rich or poor, feel the urge to help one another in this time of sickness and unemployment. Yet, the percentage of Americans donating to charity has hit a new low, according to a recent Gallup Poll.

The obvious reason is the uncertainty facing most households. If you are struggling to keep food on your own table, you can't be expected to start handing out money here and there.

And yet, the need is great. "Virtually every organization has had to move to remote services or seen increases in demand." Says Stacy Palmer, editor of the Chronicle of Philanthropy". "Any help is really important right now."

Even if you can give, recent tax law changes may be holding you back. Currently, only a small minority of taxpayers can reduce their taxes by making deductible contributions because most filers are now better off taking a standard deduction rather than itemizing.

Still, there are strategies that lower the cost of giving. Here are a few ideas that may help members of our Christ Church Parish family decide on charitable giving and how that may affect their taxes.

Get a new deduction – The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, passed in March, allows taxpayers taking the standard deduction to claim up to \$300.00 in charitable deductions as well. To qualify, you must give money to what is known as a 501(c) (3) non-profit – a food bank or religious institution, for example, not a political campaign or a home-owners association. This type of deduction would




Calling for Woodworking Volunteers!

Our electronics/video camera gurus, Jack Fackler, Mike Gorin & Mike Floyd have asked Junior Warden Loustaunau if a "Camera Stand" could be built in the rear corner of the Church for the camera operator to stand on while videoing the various services which will be live-streamed & or recorded. Being very much of a can-do sort of guy, he promptly said "Yes!" and then promptly called me (Robin Wells) and asked me if I could build it, to which I replied (not as promptly), "Sure!".

I have received a scale drawing for the size from the video guys. Attached is a VERY rough sketch of how the stand will look.

First of all, the stand will be quite substantial and moveable using an appliance dolly. It will measure approximately 41"x41"x76". The sides and the door will be the raised panel design exactly like the chair height panels all the away around the Church. It will be painted white with brown trim to match the church colors. The framework will be of 2x4s and 2x8s. Exterior raised panel walls will be constructed from 5/8" thick MDF.

I need a couple of woodworking volunteers to meet with me at Church to finalize the design and build list. MDF & paint will be purchased from W.D. Campbell in



Richmond at wholesale costs courtesy of Mike Johnson of Upland Kitchens in Bridgewater, VA. Framing will be from M&M. I will have materials from M&M delivered to my shop in Deltaville and will pick up MDF & paint in Richmond. Now the construction fun begins! One or two folks will really be handy at this point - no, actually necessary! We will schedule all workdays to suit the volunteers.

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be a perfect way to donate to the Christ Church Endowment Fund.

Use your IRA – If you are 70 ½ or older, you are eligible for a great tax break. You can give directly from a traditional IRA to a 501(c)(3) charity without having to declare the amount as taxable income, as you would a regular IRA withdrawal. Make sure the checks are made out not to you but to the charity (which can't be what's known as a donor-advised fund). Required minimum distributions are waived for this year, but in future years you'll be able to use contributions to fulfill all or part of any RMD's you might feel obligated to take. Give Assets – Instead of making a cash donation to a charity, offer to make that gift in the form of shares of stock or mutual funds that have risen in value since you have owned them. If you have held the shares for at least a year, you can give them away without having to pay a tax on any capital gains. Amass your gifts - In 2020, the standard federal deduction, used in lieu of itemized deductions, is \$24,800 for couples and \$12,400 for single tax filers (slightly higher if you're at least 65 or blind). If your potential deductions, such as mortgage interest and medical care, come close to matching your standard deduction, you can make extra charitable gifts this year (offsetting them with smaller donations next year) and get a larger tax break by itemizing.

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Finally, if you are wealthy enough to have significant savings and be in a position to itemize, you get a CARES Act break, too. For 2020 only, you can deduct cash contributions up to 100 percent of your adjusted gross income, instead of the prior 60 percent limit. You could turn "Terrible 2020" into your year to make a grand gesture.



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
