

Last year Advent began on November 27th and ended on Christmas eve. It was the longest that Advent could last, 28 days. This year Ad vent will begin on December 3rd and of course, will end on December 24th which makes it the shortest number of days in Advent, 22 days. This is all determined by the four Sundays prior to Christmas Day. That, means that we have six less days in which to prepare for Christmas Day.

I've often heard people say, "You know, it will be here before you know it." That's very true of this year's Christmas Celebration.

Normally we don't see any Christmas greenery, wreaths, poinsettias, and Nativity set up until after Advent 4 in the church. If we followed that rule this year, it would mean that we would only have five hours to go from a stark Advent scene to all the festive finery that transforms the church in preparation for celebrating our Lord's birth. Therefore, we may have much of the greenery up before Advent 4 this year.

The suddenness of this year's Christmas eve service reminds us of the message of Advent. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. Keep awake ... what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.

May you all have a blessed and meaningful Advent season as we prepare to celebrate Christ's birth. – Fr. Stuart


Mid-week Eucharist

Gratitude also to Dave South for heading the parking operations and to the many men and women who helped set up, serve, and break down after the luncheon.

As we move into Advent, we wanted to offer our Wednesday Advent dinner guests some nuggets of information to gladden the heart. We have decided to couple the Advent scriptures each week with a particular country, serve and share their cuisine, and explore unique ways in which these cultures celebrate the Advent season.

Our first Advent dinner takes place on 6 December and will highlight Poland. The second dinner on 13 December will zoom in on Greece and our third dinner on 20 December highlights Mexico. Report on the 2023 Virginia Diocesan Convention from Bob Prichard, Peg Moncure and Ann de Peyster

The 229th Annual Diocesan Convention was held in Fredericksburg on November 2-3. Ann was the lay delegate from CCP elected by the vestry, and Peg and Bob participated as clergy of the diocese. Fr. Stuart would have been there as well if he had not been sick. This experience provided a rare opportunity to meet all of our new diocesan clergy leaders in one place; learn about priorities for the diocese; celebrate Eucharist with many friends and acquaintances from around the diocese; and participate in conducting some of the business of the diocese.

This was the first convention with our new Bishop the Rt. Reverand Mark Stevenson and others he has appointed. The overall theme was "Closing the Gap Between Religion and Life." Bishop Stevenson's address on Friday morning focused on two main pillars as initial priorities: racial justice and healing, and discipleship. The Rt. Reverand Gayle Harris, the second African American woman to serve as a bishop in the Episcopal Church and now Assistant Bishop of Virginia, delivered a powerful sermon that also addressed these priorities. The assembly also heard from the renowned Dr. Catherine Meeks, founding Executive Director of the Absalom Jones Episcopal Center for Racial Healing. Dr. Meeks addressed the Convention virtually via Zoom, speaking on racial justice and taking questions from the audience.

Like bishops of the diocese before him, Bishop Stevenson brought his perspective to the worship of the convention. Thursday night's worship—a celebration of Evensong for which clergy of the diocese were expected to vest in cassock and surplice and process—was a first for the diocese. The same was true of one of the bishop's choices of his vesture. He may have been the first Bishop of Virginia to wear a purple zucchetto at a diocesan convention. This is the skull cap commonly worn by Roman Catholic bishops but less often by Episcopal bishops.

Bob attended a workshop titled "Best Practices in Church Accounting and Bookkeeping" led by diocesan Treasurer Ted Smith. It included references to several helpful resources; the PowerPoint used with the talk is posted at PowerPoint Presentation (episcopalvirginia.org) Peg attended a workshop on "Video Storytelling – Start to Finish Video Production." Attendees were given a lot of good information about recording the stories of people in our parishes. Peg thinks it would be especially nice to record some of our people who have been at CCP for a long time and thus document our history. This might be worth pursuing in the future. The only issue with the workshop was too much information in a short time. Ann chose "The Work of Reparations – Why and How?" Participants agreed that "repair" is probably a better choice of words than "reparations" when expressing the Diocese's actual intent now – reparations are often limited (at least in the public's mind) to monetary compensation for injustices of the past. The current focus is instead on identifying attitudes and

behaviors indicative of racial bias that can be very subtle, overlooked, and allowed to propagate.

Resolutions were passed related to the printed Book of Common Prayer; the process of transfer of Bishops and Deacons; endorsing affordable housing development on church property; and Diocesan actions related to the war between Israel and Hamas. Related to that last resolution, when speaking in favor of this resolution a young college-age delegate reminded the assembly that young people are more apt to become interested in participating in religions that demonstrate active involvement in world affairs, thus "bridging the gap between life and religion." Worship Committee—Christian Education

So, following the Wednesday morning chapel service, we will retire to the Great Hall and try this approach. Father Stuart and Deacon Peg have other duties at that time, so this will be led by lay folk, starting with the Verger, or anyone else interested. There are SO many choices for our subjects, but here is a sampling of what we already own, each with a DVD and course guide.

The Christian tradition of Advent, dating back to the 4th century, involves a period of anticipation and preparation for the birth of our Christ at Christmas. While not initially associated with meals, the practice evolved over time. In medieval Europe, the "Advent fast" gradually transformed into a season marked by communal meals, emphasizing fellowship and spiritual reflection. The Advent wreath, a symbol with candles representing the weeks leading to Christmas, further became a centerpiece for these gatherings. Today, Advent meals continue as a cherished practice, fostering community and contemplation amid the holiday season....Merry Christ Mass
