### From Our Rector



Merry Christmas and a blessed Epiphany. Yes, it's still appropriate to wish people Merry Christmas through January 5<sup>th</sup>, which is the twelfth day of Christmas, and then we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany when we remember the visit of the wise men drawn to Bethlehem by the guiding of a star.

The first Sunday after Christmas day the gospel was the prologue of John 1:1-18 and it speaks of light, the true light, which has come into the world. "What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." 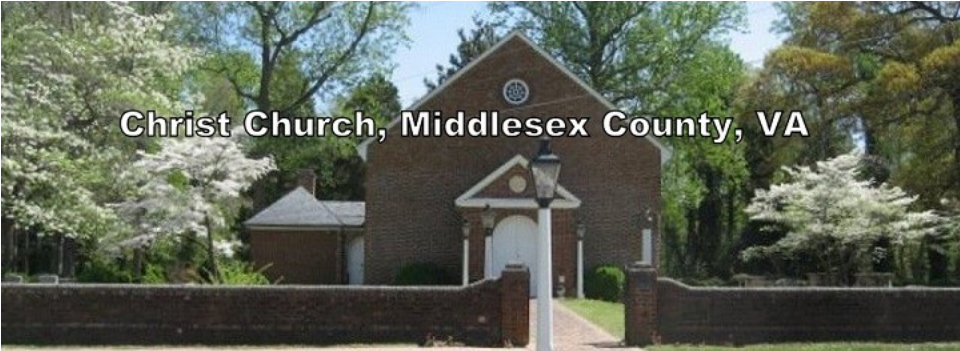

## Catechism Corner

**Mission: A small corner of faith, understanding and education**



The Bread at the celebration of the Eucharist leavened or not?

From Christianity's earliest days, baptized Christians were understood to reaffirm their unity with each other and with Jesus Christ himself in the celebration of the Eucharist and the reception of the consecrated bread and wine. Without firm proof and recalling that the first celebration happened during Passover when leavening was prohibited by Jewish law, the Roman Catholic norm was unleavened bread.

By the end of the medieval period, the Reformations found critics of the traditional liturgy became more vocal, and western Christianity was divided into two major "camps": the traditional Catholics and a growing cluster of "reformed" church communities known generally as "Protestant" churches. Prayer Books of 1549 and 1552 adopted the "reform" attitude, breaking with Rome allowing leavened bread.

Loaf bread once again became common in Episcopal churches after the 1979 prayer book was adopted, particularly in congregations big enough to support weekly bread baking.

With no instruction in the prayer book about what kind of bread to use, Episcopal clergy and congregations are free to make their own decisions!

The Elephant in the Room!

During this Christmas Season, I am totally amazed at the level of activity and the number of our parishioners involved in our church and outreach activities within our community. It is so inspiring to witness it and to be a small part of it. But as we go about contributing to our church, our activities often lead to discussions about issues we’re all facing, or what is holding us back, or what are we really worried about in our church.

And this most often results in a statement from one or more people saying, “Our congregation is shrinking in numbers”! In discussing problems with balancing our budget, we all acknowledge that more members would provide the additional revenue that we sorely need. To maintain our facilities, there are very few of us that can (or should) be on a ladder or able to crawl into tight spaces to fix something. To participate in the Oyster Festival, we acknowledge that there are very few of us to work the many positions required for setting up the booth, cooking and selling the food, and then cleaning up afterward. And on Sunday mornings, at least at the 1030 service, it’s quite lonely with only 30-some people in attendance, half of whom are supporting or taking part in the service. And the list could go on. This ‘shrinking in numbers’ is our “Elephant in the Room” that needs to be corralled as it is overshadowing all that we do.

On a positive note, I don’t hear us laying blame on any person or activity or lack of activity. I think we are all aware that there are various reasons, some out of our control, that are contributing to this situation. They include the fact that many people have re-located away from the area, we are all aging so many can no longer attend regularly, and the pandemic has put a real damper on getting together with people. But even if these things are out of our control, we still need to grow our church community. And I have heard almost all of us express a desire to do something about this, but still nothing happens.

Recognizing this, the Vestry has asked me, but is really asking all of us, to form an Ad-Hoc Committee. Its purpose is to “corral this elephant” by studying this situation and developing strategies for our church that will promote growth in our parish. Since most of us are complaining about the situation, many of us are probably willing to help.

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I suggest we start by exploring Diocesan resources for strategies, then meet soon to “brainstorm” strategies, identify our target markets, scrutinize our actions that may be alienating people, reinforce all those things we’re doing right, and with the permission of the Vestry, commence executing the strategies.

I admit that this may be an over-simplification. But it is a starting point that I hope energizes many of us to want to participate. If you can help, and I know you can, please contact me by phone, text, or email now!

I look forward to hearing from you about your thoughts and ideas that we can follow up on right after the first of the year!!!

## Videography Team Ministry Ready for New Members in 2022

**Do you want to make a huge contribution to our outreach mission?** Thereby also taking steps that have potential to expand our church membership? Learn new skills? Work with a wonderful group of talented, dedicated and best of all collegial Christ Church members? If any or all of the above, seriously consider joining the videography ministry component of the Communications team. Numerous churches are planning to continue their online services indefinitely. We believe we should also remain in that mainstream at least for the foreseeable future.

**Some have referred to some of us as "geeks."** I can assure you that I have zero geek genes, only a strong desire to support our online ministry effort. The proliferation of remote-control devices in our living alone is enough to intimidate me. Yes, I use a computer and "do" email and zoom, but I avoid all social media technologies insofar as possible. I have so admired and appreciated the expertise, dedication, and patience of my technology mentors within our group, namely Mike Floyd, Mike Gorin, Jack Fackler, and Greg Grichtmeier, as well as the able leadership of Jeff Loustaunau who keeps us on track.

**Our main goal over the past 9 months has been to establish a sustainable program of live streamed/recorded worship services.** In March of this year we submitted a successful Mustard Seed grant proposal to support additional state-of-the-art equipment. By Palm Sunday we were recording in-person services, relieving Fr. Stuart of the task of recording online services that he had so ably handled throughout the worst of the pandemic. Ensuring the online version conveys substantially what others see and hear in person has been an interesting and rewarding challenge. Enabling those who really can't physically make it to church for whatever reason to continue to connect regularly with Christ Church has been tremendously satisfying.

**We are about to embark on an exciting "Phase II"** now that new equipment acquisition and operating procedures have stabilized. This includes planning to train new recruits starting in early 2022. We are a very small team, and, unfortunately, anyone can suffer burnout or be unable to participate on any given Sunday. Unless we find others willing to join us we're a little concerned about the sustainability of this worthwhile effort. Interested candidates could also be parishioners' relatives or significant others or even friends willing to make the commitment. What you or they would learn would look great on a resume.

**To remedy our concern about backup videographers, we will be offering a training program starting early 2022 with start date TBD.** We understand that buttons, knobs and switches can appear intimidating to some but they can all be mastered with some practice. Your instructors would never expect anyone to simply "see one do one". We are all committed to helping anyone who wants to learn in an enjoyable, low stress way, and eventually feel comfortable and confident managing the camera and sound adjustments before a first solo flight.

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**How successful have we been so far with this online worship outreach ministry?** It takes time to accumulate and interpret enough data to be meaningful, but we also understand that some are increasingly curious. At this point responsible reporting still limits us to only the following:

The overall average viewers of recordings was 74 and the median was 75 from April 4 (Palm Sunday) to November 28 when basic statistics were first examined in any quantitative way. However, if one focuses on the most recent 20 weeks, about 70% of viewer numbers are higher than this. In fact, the recorded service on the day of Halloween-- the day before All Saints' Day -- shows an astonishing 202 viewers on Facebook. In a statistical sense that appears to be an outlier, but in fact that's what Facebook recorded. Who is taking advantage of our online offerings is harder to determine but we're working on that. We can know identities of viewers only if they email us or comment on Facebook. Examining a list of names of those who have posted comments since our recordings began confirms that we are indeed engaging others outside of our church membership.

Every single comment -- even an emoji -- contributes to an understanding of how viewers are reacting to our services. If you are simply watching and not commenting, please remember that comments help a whole lot to keep us energized and continuing to do our best.

## My Story; Our Story; The Story

Bishop G. Porter Taylor has been offering thought provoking zoom classes deeply enriched with personal experiences and reflections since he became Assisting Bishop in the Diocese of Virginia in 2020. In addition to a Master of Divinity, Bishop Taylor holds both a B.A. and an M.A. in English, and a Ph.D. in Theology and Literature. He was a visiting professor at Wake Forest University Divinity School before joining the Diocese of Virginia. It would be exceedingly difficult to find anyone more qualified to lead discussions on ***how fiction and poetry can take us deeper into our faith.*** He is offering two tracks for his latest course offering titled ***My Story; Our Story; The Story:*** A Clergy Track on Thursdays at 4 p.m., January 13 - February 24, and a Lay Track: Wednesdays, 3 p.m. January 12 - February 23 OR Thursdays, 1:30 p.m. January 13 - February 23. Each non-credit/no stress class is typically one hour. Reading the selections beforehand is important but usually minimal effort. If you wish to join these online small group discussions or have questions, email Anita Lisk, [alisk@thediocee.net](mailto:alisk@thediocee.net), and indicate if you are clergy or lay. Excerpts from this latest course description are in italics:

*"As human beings we make meaning through story. Stories are how we connect with one another. When you are introduced to a stranger, you begin with your story: 'Where I am from; what I do; what are my passions' and so on.... In addition, the deeper truth can often only be reached through story. We know this from reading the gospels. People asked Jesus a complicated question, and he answered with a story: 'Once there was a man who had two sons...'*

This latest series of classes starting in January 2022 *"is intended to deepen our awareness and our reservoir of story and of image. We will read short stories and poems and use them as the way to go deeper into the Good News and how we encounter it in our lives."*

Some newsletter readers may recall that the May and August 2021 issues included contributions from Sharon Colston and Ann de Peyster describing their experiences in another class offered by Bishop Taylor focusing on the writings of Christian mystics. Participants in his classes immediately sense his passion and infectious enthusiasm for literature and especially poetry. But he tells us that this upcoming class *"...is not an English class but a Theology class that uses fiction and poetry as the doorway into the mysteries of our faith. Plus, talking about fiction and poetry is fun. We will use two anthologies: one for poems and the other for short stories.... The poetry anthology is **Joy: 100 Poems**, Edited by Christian Wiman."* Bishop Taylor says he is still deciding on the short story anthology but will decide soon.

Ann DePeyster
