

Reflections from an inspiring month.

During the month of April we celebrated Easter, I traveled to the Republic of Ireland, and I returned to finish off the month with a Sunday evening Celtic service. It was definitely a month of "highs" for me.

It is simply awesome to reflect on the way that Easter and our Lord's resurrection has changed the history of the world. Visiting monastic sites around Ireland and realizing their tenacity to overcome overwhelming obstacles is so inspiring. Time and time again the monasteries and the villages around them were pillaged and burned, people killed and

their valuables taken. Each time they took what they had left and rebuilt and continued to worship, teach, share the faith and give to the poor and needy. They lived the words of Joshua, chapter 1 verse 9 "I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Ireland has passed down to us the legacy of individuals such as Patrick, Brigid, Columba, and Ciaran who founded the monastery of Clonmacnoise where some of the oldest and most decorated Celtic stone crosses are found.

But my trip had a sad side to it as well. Driving through the countryside on the tour we saw many churches that were closed, or churches that had services only several times a year. Beautiful ancient buildings that are closed due to the lack of parishioners. Where persecution and invasion couldn't stop the spread of Christianity, secular interests, political differences and apathy are succeeding.

There is a revival of Celtic Christianity that is renewing and refreshing. From the early monastic writings to new contemporary writers, people are finding ways to experience God through old ways of thinking that are being rediscovered and made new for today. This is what I hope people will experience in the several Celtic services that we are planning to have each year. I was thrilled with how well the one in April was attended and the wonderful feedback that was received.

I would like to end with a sample of some of the wisdom from the 4th/5th century, "St. Ninian's catechism."

Question: What is best in this world?

Answer: To do the will of our maker.

Question: What is his will?

Answer; That we should live according to the laws of

His creation.

Question: How do we know those laws?.

Answer: By study – studying the Scriptures with de-

votion.

Question What tool has our Maker provided for this

study?

Answer: The intellect, which can probe everything.

Question: And what is the fruit of study?

Answer: To perceive the eternal Word of God reflected

In every plant and insect, every bird and ani

mal and every man and woman.
