

Message From Our Rector



"I will with God's help."

This past Sunday the Church celebrated one of the Principle celebrations of the church year; the feast of Pentecost. This feast day comes exactly fifty days after Easter and ten days after the Ascension. It celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit to God's people. It empowered the first Christians to go out into all the world to share the Good News of God's redeeming work through his Son Jesus Christ our Lord. To heal the sick, care for those in need, restore those who are lost, to give sight to the blind, and to bring new life to the dead.

Pentecost reminds us each year that we too are to go out into all the world and share our faith in Christ to this broken and sinful world. Our journey begins with our Baptism. At that time, we are asked to continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers. We are asked to persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever we fall into sin, to repent and return to the Lord. We are asked to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ. To seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves. And finally, to strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. And the answer to each of those questions is, "I WILL WITH GOD'S HELP."

We are reminded to do those same things when we stand before a bishop at Confirmation and renew our commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to do those ministries that will bring others to know God's love in their lives.

We also renew those promises for ourselves along with the candidates and sponsors at every baptism and confirmation that we attend and also at the Great Vigil of Easter each year. And on each occasion, we respond once again, "I WILL WITH GOD'S HELP."

What are we saying with that response? Are we acknowledging that we know that we can't be faithful or successful in these promises unless God helps us? I would say the answer to that is "Yes." Are we making excuses for our failures because we do not feel that God is helping us because we fail to be open to it? Sometimes. Are we one of those individuals that says, "I don't need anyone's help including God to get through this life? Possibly, and therefore

we reject God's help and don't say that response with any sincerity. So, what am I trying to say? I'm saying that as we journey through life and try to fulfill the promises we have made to God that we must know and except our limitations and then strive to listen for God's direction in our life, and to stop being stubborn and to embrace God's help when it is being given.

There is a Commission given at the end of the Pentecost service in the Church of England in their worship resource "Common Worship." I believe that it gives us some guidance on how to live into that response, "I will with God's help." It tells us to dare to walk into God's future, trusting him to be our guide; to embrace each other and grow together in love, to share our riches in common and minister to each other in need, to pray for each other until our hearts beat with the longings of God, and to carry the light of Christ into the world's dark places.

So let the Holy Spirit empower you, embrace you, and guide you. Let it blow you in directions that you may have never dreamt of going, and to bring you to Christ's light and peace.

Thanks be to God. Alleluia, alleluia.

THE RESULTS OF "TUNING IN":

As many of us attended our May 7th meeting, and many more are aware, we had a lot of energy and great discussions around what we can do as a Parish since "IT TAKES A PARISH TO GROW A PARISH". The discussion was led by Bob Prichard, our Priest Associate, with the active participation of 34 members of our congregation who were split up into five smaller discussion groups.

Bob started us off with thoughts from the Outline of Faith found in our Book of Common Prayer (pages 855-856) that speak to the mission of the Church and how it is carried out through the ministry of its members. These thoughts are summed up nicely in our Mission for Christ Church.

"We are a family of faith, growing in Christ through worship, learning, and service who strive to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves."

He then posed four questions for discussion, which over the next four months, we will address what our discussions revealed, one question at a time. This month's question is "What brought you to Christ Church Parish and what keeps you coming back?"


The discussion provided very clear input and a call for very specific action. Most of us, especially when new to the area, were looking for a church home, whether we were Episcopalians or not. And most often, we were INVITED by members of the congregation to attend a service or an event. Yes, some of us simply visited the church because we heard of it, but most of us were INVITED. And once here, we found a WARM, FRIENDLY, AND ACCEPTING congregation that we wanted to be a part of.

So, what can we do to "grow a parish"? Continue to be that warm, friendly, and accepting congregation that makes so many of us want to belong here, and invite those new neighbors, who are transitioning to the area for retirement, a second home, or who can now work remotely. To help with that, we have two types of calling cards available to us. The first is the "Random Acts of Kindness" cards that we introduced a few years ago. The second is the All Are Welcome cards that include a QR code. Both types are available in the Parish Hall/Church Office.

Joint Organ Recital in Mathews

On Sunday, June 25 at 4:00 pm, I will present a joint concert with Danny Corneliussen, the organist of Kingston Parish, and Coleman Tyler, organist, composer, and Anglican priest. You will hear Coleman again in July when he substitutes for me during my vacation and trip to Sewanee for the Episcopal Church Music Conference.

The concert will be at Kingston Chapel in the Parish House at 370 Main Street in Mathews. The organ, the same model Rodger's electronic organ we have at Christ Church, has been enhanced with a small number of actual pipes.

The program, A Celebration of British Music, will include organ and choral music from throughout the British Isles. A combined choir will sing several well-known hymn settings. The audience is invited to join in the singing.

I will be playing Elgar's Nimrod, Karl Jenkin's Benedictus, and Vaughan Williams' Rhosymedre. Other selections will include Variations on God Save the King and a hymn written by Coleman that is based on the tune Highland Cathedral.

In last Sunday's sermon, Father Stuart encouraged us to pick up and peruse the Book of Common Prayer. I am very pleased that our little church embraces the full richness of the BCP, not allowing much of it to go unexercised for long. Of course, the Holy Eucharist is celebrated as the "principal act of Christian worship on the Lord's Day" but the opening paragraph of the BCP goes on to add that "Daily Morning and Evening Prayer...are...regular services appointed for public worship in this Church."

I've been an Episcopalian long enough to remember that Morning Prayer was the norm and the Eucharist was a monthly celebration. When I'm asked why we don't use the Apostle's Creed each Sunday as they remember, that is why: that creed is part of Morning and Evening Prayer. Now, with the Eucharist as the principal service, we are beginning to become less familiar with the differences and may fumble a bit when we come to Morning Prayer, switching between Rite I and II in the Eucharist, Morning or Evening Prayer, and Compline. Fortunately, Father Stuart has anticipated this, and when we are embracing a less familiar service, he spells it all out in detail in the bulletin. That is a blessing too!

So...rather than finding discomfort in less used service options, let us examine and enjoy their difference and experience all that we can in this magnificent Book of Common Prayer. Maybe we can even relearn how to do the canticles!

FROM "ACROSS THE POND"...



The Father of the Abrahamic Religions

Abraham was born in Ur in Chaldea, now modern day Iraq, and his family moved to Haran when he was 70 years old. God called Abraham to leave Haran and journey to an undesignated land to found a new nation. That land was Canaan. At 75 years of age he unquestioningly obeyed God's commands from whom he received a covenant that his "seed" would inherit the land. His journey from Haran to Canaan with "all the family souls and possessions" was made by foot and took him about three months.

Abraham is revered for his faith in one god (monotheism) at a time when polytheism (multiple gods) was adhered to by the Jewish and Muslim faiths. Both of whom now claim him as their ancestor through his two sons Isaac and Ishmael. Christians see him as a spiritual ancestor. Those religions are now known as the three Abrahamic Religions.
