

Rector's Message

Alleluia. Christ is risen.

The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

This season of Easter, from Holy Week to Easter Day and now progressing through the great fifty days of Easter has certainly been one that we will all remember. It is still hard to know if May 31st, The Day of Pentecost, will find us gathered in the power of the Spirit or simply bound together in the Spirit still worshipping from a position of self-isolation. Right now, it still sounds like we will have to worship from home.

So much has happened since we were all able to worship together in the church and receive the blessed sacrament.

Good Friday was truly a day that pierced my soul. I learned that morning that Susan Neal would be coming home the next day. I called Susan at the hospital and had a nice talk with her in which she shared what may happen the next day. I prayed with her and for her family and then she said goodbye and said that we would get to talk again in heaven. Throughout our conversation, there was a peace in her voice, a confidence in her faith, and even her smile seemed to carry over the phone. As I hung up, my heart broke and the tears flowed and I thought about those who stood at the foot of the cross that day and watched Jesus die. Holy Saturday was a day of watching and waiting and then the news came at sunrise on Easter morning. How comforting it was to know that as we prepared to celebrate our Lord's resurrection, that Susan was watching the sunrise over the river as she joined our Lord who had broken the bonds of death and opened to us the way to eternal life.

One of the prayers from the Easter Vigil encourages us to "let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." As you may have heard or read, the great room in the parish hall had certainly grown old and is now in the process of being made new.


Junior Warden Input

Just a thought from your friendly Endowment Fund Board

After the shock of the notion that we were going to be spending LOTS of time at home, "social distancing," many of us probably began to make lists of the long-deferred things we could profitably accomplish with this unexpected time. I know I did, and just yesterday had the terrible thought that I had many

of those tasks still undone and that we could be liberated and they would still be languishing.

If you are one of those folks who made cleaning off your desk an early task, you may well have discovered a buried document from your Endowment Fund Board, one that walked you through the process of being sure that your desires for so many issues associated with the end of life were well and clearly stated. So, my friends, this really is a very good time to finish that task, and you will be very glad you did. I know you've read the heartbreaking stories of people who were suddenly cut off from their families and isolated in ICU's, and the opportunity to communicate those important issues was lost. Of course, we all hope never to be in that position, but it is in your hands now to be sure you are not.

So please, take a couple of hours now to complete that document. If any part of it is too daunting, leave it blank. Perfection isn't required. There is a copy on the church website if you cannot find yours. Or contact me and I will be sure one is promptly sent to you.

As part of the package to stimulate the economy, for 2020 the IRS will have no limit on charitable deductions for those who itemize. For those who do not itemize, the IRS will allow up to \$300 in charitable deductions in addition to the standard deduction.

The stimulus package also includes \$1,200 (\$2,400 per couple) for taxpayers who meet certain income criteria. This money is not taxable income. As many of us are retired and do not have diminished income due to Covid-19 closures, this is really "found money."

As always, you should consult your tax advisor, and this summary of information, from Diocese Webinars and Forbes and Money.com, is not intended to be tax advice. However, it appears that a portion of that "found money" could go to the church to help with its financial crunch, and reduce your taxes as well. and we hope you will consider that for all or a portion of your stimulus check.

As many of you have undoubtedly noticed, our church directory is in need of an update. Father Stuart recently suggested to the vestry that we investigate a software system used by Ware Church in Gloucester, and we are in the process of doing that. The great advantage of the system is that we would have the real-time capability to update information as soon as it is received.

We realize that in this digital age, some of you may have reservations about having your information online. First and foremost, we want to assure you that any system we would use will only be accessible to members of Christ Church Parish. We will also develop a privacy policy that precludes the use of the directory for any purpose other than communication to and among our church family.

We now have a committee of three to work on this project consisting of Pam McClelland, Lydia Dudley, Mike Floyd. Mike is already exploring the software on a 30- day free trial.

Once we can resume church services, we will set up a process for picture taking if needed. You will also be able to submit your own pictures along with any updated information.

We will keep you informed as this project develops.
