

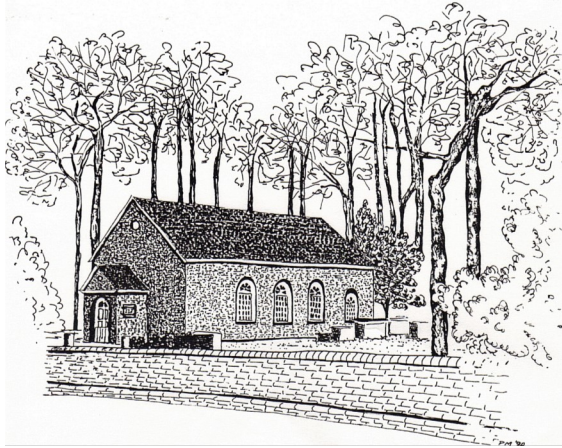

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From Darkness Into Light

The last week of July found me staying at the Roslyn Conference Center in Richmond and heading over to St. Stephen's for their daily Morning Prayer with communion service at 8:10 a.m. each morning. From there it was upstairs in the Christian Education building for the icon painting (writing) class that I take each year. This was my eighth year and it is something that I really look forward to because I enjoy working with the teacher and reconnecting with friends that come back each year for the class.

Each year I am amazed at how dark the first layer of paints are as all the different sections of the icon board are covered. It's almost a retelling of the creation story. "And the earth was without form, and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters." (Genesis 1:2) Upon this darkness the first highlights are painted. Lighter colors that start bringing shape and meaning to the darkness below. But this brightness is then obscured by the application of another dark coat of paint, though a bit more translucent than the first, in order to allow the light to shine through. Then comes a brighter though

smaller highlight that gives further definition to the different elements of the icon. This process of alternating dark, light, dark, light continues several more times; always ending with light, until the image is fully revealed and God’s unending light shines through revealing His love and continued presence in our lives. The final details are “life-giving lines” which are hardly noticeable but can, in fact, make a huge difference in the final result.

For me, the icon is a symbol of our lives in which we often shift back and forth from darkness to light. Depression, stress, grief, conflict, anxiety and other emotions bring the darkness. Love, joy, laughter, a bright sunny day, a friendly smile, and a kind compliment bring with them the light. Romans 13:12 encourages us with these words, “the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light.”

Let us remember that we are always surrounded by both darkness and light, but our Lord came to show us the light that gives hope and life to those who believe. He gave of himself so that his light may shine in us and through us and that is the very light that helps us to walk through the valley of the shadow of death and fear no evil for his rod and staff are there to comfort us.

The prologue to the Gospel according to St. John says it best for me: “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him, not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

So in the same way, may you let your light shine before others, so that they may be built up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear.

THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

August 3, 2018

Dear Diocesan Family,

After many months of intense prayer and reflection, and in close consultation with the Presiding Bishop and our Standing Committee, I am formally announcing that I have decided to resign my office and ministry as Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia effective November 3, 2018, prior to the adjournment of our annual convention. I will then serve the diocese in a consulting capacity to facilitate the transition to new leadership. I will fully retire effective July 1, 2019, having served over twelve years as a bishop in this diocese.

First of all, I want to say in all honesty that being the XIII Bishop of Virginia has been the greatest honor and privilege of my life. I love this diocese with all my heart. I have also had extraordinary opportunities in places across the globe. I have learned much about the “big things” as well as about how deeply meaningful the so-called small things can be. After all these years of ministry serving as your bishop, there is something surreal about letting go. I have no idea what will come next, except that I shall take an extended period of rest, which will include times for spiritual retreat and discernment. I know that I shall miss my week-to-week ministry, especially spending time with our clergy and interacting with parishioners, but, actually, I am quite excited to have things so open-ended! Ellen and I shall remain in Richmond, where we very happily bought a home two years ago. We look forward to having more time to spend with friends as well as taking opportunities to travel. I also want to make up for a lot of lost time with my family in Alabama and Georgia.

I am proud of the work and accomplishments that we have achieved together under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Several of these accomplishments include:

- the successful resolution of the unprecedented lawsuit returning schismatically-claimed property for the mission of the Episcopal Church;
- the historic success of the capital campaign for our camps program at Shrine Mont;
- embracing and fully including LGBT Christians in our ordination process and in the rite of Christian marriage; our recovery of the Church’s voice for faith and advocacy in the “public square,”

- raised in our internationally-noted presence at the Charlottesville rally opposing the White supremacy demonstrations, as we had already opened a critical dialogue on the sin and experience of racism;
- the newly re-drawn diocesan Regions that better reflect—and thus will better serve—the demographics and growth of today’s Commonwealth of Virginia;
- and (lastly but surely not least) our diocese is growing again and our unity, confidence, and morale are high.

There is so much more that could be noted. I certainly do not claim or imply that “I” did all this, but we did, and I am rightly proud of this era I have shared with you in the life of the Diocese of Virginia.

My reasons for reaching this decision that a change of leadership is now good and wise begin with the fact that I feel that I have given my all. Quite simply, “the time” has come. I truly believe that I have done all that I can to accomplish what I feel I was called here to do. And so, I am convinced that it is now time for new vision and new energy for the Church in our diocese.

Equally important as a factor in my decision is that my wife Ellen and I are looking toward sharing an active and full life in retirement years. As I reach the age of sixty (after serving the Church for over thirty years) and being in strong health, I have confidently chosen to claim this season of life for the fuller nurture of our personal life. Someone else can assume my responsibilities as Bishop of Virginia, but no one else can love Ellen as I do.

As I write this letter I realize with certainty that my decision is for the best. While I am aware that there is some speculation about my retirement, please know that this letter conveys what is, in fact, my own personal truth about my decision to resign. You should also know that it is in consultation with my closest friends, colleagues, and advisors that Ellen and I agree that it is time for me to move on, in God’s grace for us and for the Diocese of Virginia. Be assured that the Presiding Bishop’s office will be in communication with our diocesan leadership regarding the next steps and the particulars for episcopal leadership in Virginia going forward.

I look upon my ministry as bishop among you in terms of having shared milestone moments of God moving decisively in the lives of Virginia Episcopalians. We have grown together as disciples of Jesus Christ. That is what the Church is all about. In the end, I am profoundly gratified by what I believe to have been a consequential episcopate.

“Jacob's Ladder campers to perform ‘The Little Mermaid’

Twenty-seven years ago Jacob's Ladder held its first camp at Christchurch School. Jacob's Ladder celebrates as the camp has returned to the sea where it all started with a presentation of the musical “The Little Mermaid.” All are invited to be guests at the musical on Saturday, July 28, with performances at 2:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. at Christchurch School in the Marston Performing Arts Center.

For Climbers, as the students are called, storytelling, speaking to defend a position in a debate, or the reading of your poem or vignette is an everyday

occurrence at camp. These skills are further enhanced as each Climber is required to participate in a drama class. Here some find they have a gift for drama and lend their talents to the yearly musical.



Nicole Pearson, director of academic studies and performing arts, sharpens the Climbers' skills in an intense two weeks of practice, costume design, set design and making, sound and lighting coordination. “I am so excited to give 33 Climbers the enrichment opportunity of performing,” said Pearson. “It is my hope that collaborat-

ing as a team and stepping outside of their comfort zone in this capacity will serve as a reminder of their capabilities in the other eleven months of the year.”

As Susan Albaugh begins her first year as executive director, she recognizes the power of performing in raising self-awareness and self-confidence for the Climbers. “They take risks in a supportive environment to participate in theatrical elements, often surprising themselves with new found talent and expression. Many Climbers then take these skills to their schools and participate in activities they may not have tried previously to this experience.”

Jacob's Ladder is a 501(c)(3) with a mission to aid and encourage at-risk, intellectually gifted middle school children to reach their full potential. Its vision is the children become leaders equipped to help others in similar economic and social situations. Through a proactive summer residential camp, enrichment is provided to foster their intellectual, social, emotional and physical development.

Reducing Taxes on your Required Minimum Distribution

Those of us seventy-one & a half or older and have a traditional IRA are required to withdraw funds annually from the IRA. This withdrawal is called a “Required Minimum Distribution” and is taxable in the year it is withdrawn. For those fortunate enough to have a sizable balance, this can result in a large tax obligation. The amount of the required minimum distribution is based on your IRA balance and your life expectancy as determined by the IRS.

IRS regulations allow for a Qualified Charitable Distribution as an attractive means for qualifying donors/contributors to support non-profit organizations such as Christ Church Parish and reducing the tax obligation on the RMD by the amount of the charitable gift. This distribution is generally made directly by the trustee of your IRA to an organization eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions such as Christ Church Parish. Distributions can be applied to your annual pledge or the Endowment Fund per your instructions. This is an easy means for you to support current or future financial needs of our church and reducing taxes on your required distribution.

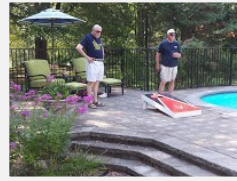
